Good Stewardship Made Easier by Good Friends

Columbia College has been the source of many good gifts for the ministry of Killingsworth, but few of



their offerings have been appreciated by our residents as much as that given by the Business Administration, Entrepreneurship and Accounting Club at the college this past March.

Jenise Gramling, president of BEA, was a counselor of a Leadership 2002 team that visited us last summer. After hours of hard work, the group toured the home, met some residents and learned of our needs. Ms. Gramling returned in the fall as a volunteer and learned more about the daily life of the residents. That familiarity led her to suggest to the BEA Club a donation that thrilled our residents!

Our agreement with the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries of the UMC calls for good stewardship of the property which they entrust to us. So, in addition to daily chores, once a month we have Cleanup Weekend because nineteen folks living close together don't always keep things as tidy and as clean as they might. It is not a popular time.

There are no overnights on Friday of Cleanup Weekend, and no free time

until all extra chores are satisfactorily completed. Baseboards are scrubbed; mattresses are turned revealing the need to clean under beds; ovens are cleaned, freezers defrosted, and bathrooms are given extra mildew checks. It is not a popular time.

Enter the BEA Club, whose members -- like all Columbia College women -- know what it is like to give up precious weekend days for "required" expectations. The members of BEA volunteered --- they **VOLUNTEERED** -- to come for Cleanup weekend in March and do everyone's details making them friends forever of all the residents. "It was just awesome!" said Sarah H. "They came in and did everything...gave up their weekend for us, and on top of that did all the drudgery. I really needed the break."

The consensus of the residents seemed to be gratitude and wonder. "Many people give us great donations," said Constance G., "but this was really special. These students gave us their time, their Saturday! Somehow they found out about Cleanup Weekend. Now understand, I don't mind doing it -- I like to live in a clean place. But after I've been working all week, I'm tired." "Me too," Sarah chimed in, "I had to work that Saturday, and I was going to have to come home and clean the big bathroom. I was so grateful to have it already done when I got home."

We have CC alumnae who serve on our Board of Directors; our full-time and part-time staff include CC graduates and current full time students; we have been a placement for mature students involved in Student Employment; we have been a service site for training residence hall counselors and for high school girls participating in summer leadership institutes....and there was the year that one of our residents was also a full-time student at Columbia College. We are delighted to have an intricate web

of supportive relationships with this wonderful United Methodist related women's college. Last March the residents of Killingsworth were especially delighted! Thank you, BEA Club.

Killingsworth Executive Director's Report

People often ask how long residents live at Killingsworth, and, the answer is "usually not long enough".



It takes a while for wounded lives to disintegrate into crisis, but once they are on that painful downward spiral, they often dwell in brokenness for a long time, often for years. Living at Killingsworth for just a few

months is rarely long enough to recover from longtime dysfunction. We encourage our residents to stay long enough to practice a healthy and responsible lifestyle so it will be easier to maintain when they move out on their own without a live-in support system 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Our average stay is six months; we prefer a year or 15 months because it just takes time for new habits and new attitudes to take hold. The track record of those women who have stayed and worked hard at the opportunities for growth they are offered is testimony to the value of a lengthy residence. These are the ones who more often "stick and hold on" to recovery from addiction, to healthy managing of mental illnesses, to responsible parenting, to jobs with a future, and to successful reintegration into the community.

However, our value about the length of time that residents live at Killingsworth has a direct and profound affect on the numbers of women that we are able to work with. For those who judge any endeavor by the total numbers, Killingsworth will not be impressive. Because we do not deal in Band-Aid hurry-up fixes, you will never hear that Killingsworth has touched thousands, even hundreds, of people during any one year.

What you will discover as you get to know the women of Killingsworth, however, is the depth and the breadth of the life changes they are making.

Hearts begin mending; grief and anger and fear are expressed in healthier ways; guilt is confessed and grace is welcomed; communication is begun and joy allowed to creep into experience; relationships are restored; children are again parented, and this time well-parented, by their own mothers; jobs are held and performed admirably and dependably; money is better managed; health issues are addressed; identity created in the image of God is reclaimed; prayer is offered and Love Is. And these changed and renewed lives touch the lives of many around them.

In April of this year two of our former residents -- who did stay a long while -- celebrated years and years of clean and responsible living. One had an anniversary of 8 years, the other for nine. We are looking forward next month to celebrating the 10-year anniversary of another former resident who has stayed in close touch with our community. Those are the kinds of numbers that are impressive. Thanks be to God.

Rivers of Life 2003

Reverend Kelli D. Waters has graciously agreed to lead a paddle on twelve rivers in South Carolina to raise money for Killingsworth. Originally scheduled for March 24-April 5, 2003, the Rivers of Life paddle had to be



rescheduled due to the continued rain this spring, which caused flooding and unsafe conditions in many rivers in the state. The event has been rescheduled for June 30-July 12th. The twelve rivers in this event are located within the 12 districts of the South Carolina Annual Conference, and in each district a United Methodist Church has agreed to sponsor the paddle.

Reverend Waters is inviting others to paddle with her to show their support for women in crisis and to enjoy this event. Paddling clubs, groups from local churches, scouting groups and

individuals are encouraged to join the fun. All of the proceeds from the \$25 fee to join in the paddle will be given directly to Killingsworth to assist in its programs and mission to women in crisis. The fee includes equipment, although paddlers are welcome to bring their own. Paddle trips will begin in the morning and will conclude by mid-afternoon. The sponsoring churches will provide paddlers with a picnic lunch after the paddle. For those that wish to show their support without paddling, consider throwing a shore support party or picnic in the state parks bordering the rivers.
